Currently there are 228 Tribal members and approximately 90 members reside on the reservation.

**Federal Status:** Pauma Band of Luiseno Indians is a federally recognized tribal government located in the Pauma Valley of Southern California. The Pauma Band is one of seven Bands of the Luiseno people located in San Diego and Riverside counties. The Pauma reservation was established in 1893.

**Industries:** Pauma produces Hass avocados, Valencia oranges and lemons; and is engaged in protection and reforestation of their tribal lands. The Pauma tribe owns and operates Casino Pauma, providing employment to the Tribal Members and the surrounding communities. Its revenues enhance the Tribal Government's ability to meet the essential needs of the membership.

**Brief History:**

The Pauma Band of Luiseño Indians strives to preserve and strengthen tribal sovereignty and self-determination through the promotion, protection and advancement of the cultural, political and economic well being of the Pauma people. As the first people of the Pauma Valley, we seek to enrich and advance the lives of our citizens and future generations through a healthy, educated and close-knit community.

The Pauma Band of Luiseño Indians and our ancestors have lived in the Pauma Valley and surrounding area since time immemorial. Our ancestors are buried here, we raise our children here, and our future generations will continue to live and prosper here. Officially established in 1893, today our nearly 6000-acre reservation encompasses only a small portion of our peoples' traditional territory, which expands Northern San Diego, Riverside and Orange Counties.

As is the case with all Native Americans; Euro-American contact, interaction and forced assimilation during the past two centuries brought immense changes to our land, people and way of life. Triumphant, we are still here, not merely surviving, but thriving in the same homeland of our ancestors. Like our ancestors, we rely on the strength of our culture and our community to face the challenges of today and tomorrow.

The Pauma Band of Luiseño Indians, historically known as the Pauma-Yuima Band of Mission Indians, is one of six federally recognized Indian tribes in the mid-southern California area who share Luiseño tribal affiliation, language, and traditions. During the 1970s, an era of Indian activism, the Luiseño people, like other tribes throughout California and across the country, experienced a resurgence of community and cultural pride. Despite the near loss of many of our traditions, if you listen carefully you will still hear our Luiseño language being spoken, our stories being handed down

from elder to child, and our prayers and songs echoing in the winds of the Pauma Valley.

As the first people of Pauma Valley, we have relied on our inherent tribal sovereignty and self-determination to carry us through the many changes we have endured.
